"Usually one of my neighbors bakes me a cake every year, but this time . . . I was in a state of shock," she says.

"It was the right thing to do," Calder, Tyma's new landlord, says. "We're family—the whole neighborhood."

Many of us have experienced it—feeling rushed and pressured in a grocery store checkout line as you try to get your items out of your basket quickly. For a person with special needs, such as dementia, social anxiety, or autism, the experience can be especially unnerving. With that in mind, a grocery store in

Forres, Scotland, introduced a "relaxed checkout" lane. Customers can remain in line as long as they need; taking it slow is okay—even encouraged. The store managers created the lane after attending a dementia awareness seminar. Management provided extra training for cashiers tending these special checkout lines, helping them make shoppers less anxious.
